New Anatomy Software

VH Dissector- 3D photographic renderings of human anatomy allows you to view anatomical structures that are based on the Visible Human Project http://www.nlm.nih.gov/research/visible/visible_human.html

This software provides images of over 2000 identified anatomic structures and the cross-sections from which they were derived. Users can examine the human body from a combination of views, including cross-sectional, systemic, clinical, surface, regional, and surgical anatomy. A little something for everyone!

So, if you don't like dealing with real cadavers try this virtual one. This is when technology really comes in handy. You can learn without passing out or getting messy!

This is due to our participation in the State University Library System comprised of all ten state universities in Florida. This package adds 130 titles to the 60 Cambridge titles that we already own. Included are titles in the areas of Medicine, Biomedical Sciences, Biology and Psychology. Enjoy!


CINAHL also available in Ovid

Don't worry, CINAHL is still available through EBSCO, but for those who prefer the Ovid platform, it's also available there. Use the Ovid link on the Shimberg Library homepage. Login using your HSC ID and password. The CINAHL link is near the end of the Ovid databases list.

OK, so which is better?

Using the Ovid platform allows you to select multiple databases to search using keywords. You can keyword search Medline (PubMed), HAPI (Health and Psychosocial Instruments), PsycINFO, the various EBM (Evidence Based Medicine) Reviews, and CINAHL all at once.

Can I get online full text journals?

EBSCO CINAHL provides links to the library's full text journals using the SFX feature. Just click the SFX icon.  At present, this feature is not available in Ovid. What this means is that EBSCO will give you full text access to almost every online journal subscribed to by our library. Ovid provides access to *their* online subscriptions, only. (See related article on **SPORT Discus**, this issue.)

Oh yeah, one last thing...

Remember, many databases *map* the keyword entries of your search to their own controlled vocabulary (thesaurus) terms, such as with Ovid Medline, PsycINFO, and CINAHL, but when you search multiple databases in Ovid, it defaults to keyword searching.

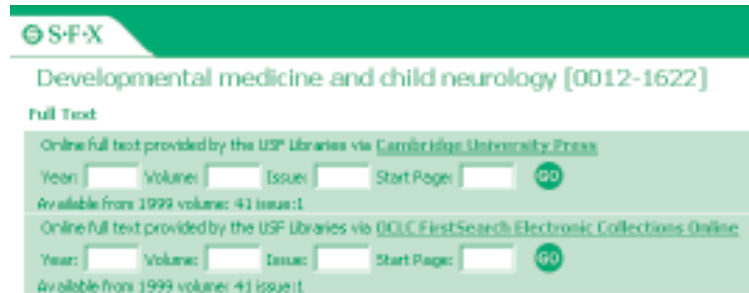


Access to Online Full Text Journals... New and Improved!

That may not mean much if you aren't familiar with the old version of SFX... or any version, for that matter. See article, "What the Heck is SFX?" (v9; i1; p3, of The CLUE) for an in-depth description.* The important thing is that when you see the SFX icon while searching a database, click it to display the online full text availability of the articles you need. The new SFX provides a new interface and more choices of access. Also, when you have filled in the citation data, year, volume, issue, page, you have to click the **GO** button to retrieve the article.

Depending on availability of the article, SFX is capable of displaying up to 50 sources, databases and journals, at once. Talk about overkill! Remember, if the first source isn't available, try the next one.

*Available from the Shimberg Library homepage. Under the *Library Information* header, click on *About the Library*. Click on *CLUE*.



SPORT Discus moves to EBSCO host (from Ovid)

If you're not familiar with the **SPORT Discus** database, it is a unique resource for both practical and research literature on sport, physical fitness and physical education topics and considered to be the world's leading sport, fitness and sports medicine bibliographic database. Over 660,000 records cover sports medicine, exercise physiology, biomechanics, psychology, training, coaching, physical education and fitness, and other sport- and fitness-related topics.

Also included are all citations from the Sport & Leisure bibliographic database covering the research literature for the social and psychological aspects of sport and leisure, including play, games and dance. Coverage includes theses and monographs from 1609 to present; and selected topics from 1859 to present.

Just a reminder, EBSCO databases offer a search feature **Limit your results: Linked Full Text** . As tempting as it is, **DO NOT CHECK THE BOX!** It links only to EBSCO's journal subscriptions, which are very few. Instead, when the results of your search are displayed, look for the SFX icon . Click it for access to the MANY (hundreds, really!) online full text journal articles available through the USF and HSC library collections. (See related article on **CINAHL**, this issue.)

To emphasize this point, when you search for the subject **WEIGHT TRAINING**, you get 7,481 hits. Do the same search and check EBSCO's **Linked Full Text** box, you get 0, nada, zilch, null... get it? **DON'T CHECK** the box! Use



ISI Web of KnowledgeSM

The *ISI Web of Knowledge*SM database offers new features to search, sort, and analyze the research literature. Check the flash message on the opening screen and the Notices page of each product for details on these enhancements.

Enhancements (more data, more control, more time)

Export, print, save and e-mail records directly from the full record and the summary results page. No extra steps!

Use the expanded display of cited references to view full titles and source data. You can see the full cited reference information, source and full title right on the cited reference page, when available.

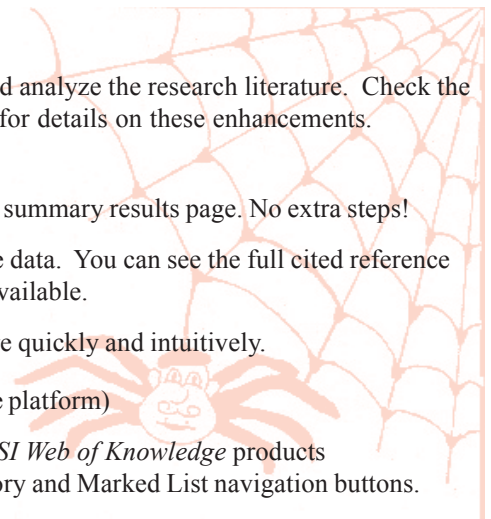
Search and sort records by publication year - finding specific records more quickly and intuitively.

Changes to *ISI Web of Knowledge CrossSearch* (improved efficiency of the platform)

Enhanced *CrossSearch* results now look the same as results from other *ISI Web of Knowledge* products and includes OpenURL links and Home, Help, Search Page, Search History and Marked List navigation buttons.

CrossSearch now includes value-added *Web of Knowledge* External Collections to widen the scope of your search, providing many more search results.

Ability to save searches in *CrossSearch* allows you to set up and save search strategies and get results without having to re-enter the search queries.
